HOPING FOR A NEW THING WE DO NOT SEE Isaiah 43:18-19; I Peter 2:9; Romans 8: 22-27 (References)

Waiting can be a happy thing! During Advent, we waited expectantly for the Christ Child to be born in us anew. We anticipated the joys of celebrating a season of Love, giving and hoping with those whom we cherish. Because of the coming of Emmanuel, God with us, we have seen fulfilled the opportunity to recognize and adore God's Incarnation in all God's glorious mystery.

In the seeming blink of an eye we have entered another season, a time of waiting for God's "new thing". Having entered the gate of the chronological New Year, we also continue to move through the babyhood, or perhaps toddlerhood of the church year, now having entered Epiphany. Along with the spiritual Epiphany of the coming of the Magi as the first manifestation of Christ to the gentiles, we have Webster's dictionary definition of an epiphany as "an intuitive grasp of reality through something (such as an event) usually simple and striking" or "an illuminating discovery, realization or disclosure".

In Isaiah 43: 18-19, likely written when Israel was about halfway through the captivity in Babylon, God tells God's

people through Isaiah,

"Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and springs in the desert.".

Clearly the message of hope to Israel is that of promised return to their homeland.

My question for us is, "How is God in the process of doing a new thing here among us, God's beloved people at St. Matthias?". Perhaps you recall the opening of the quote from Pierre Teilhard de Chardin on Patient Trust, "Above all, trust in the slow work of God.". God's thoughts and ways are not ours. (Isaiah 55:8-9)

Factually we know that we have been in transition for nineteen months, a bit more than a year and a half. We are in the company of more than forty-five other churches in the Los Angeles Diocese, also in transition.

It is not an easy place to be, but we are moving forward through the necessary steps and are nearing the beginning of our active search stage of seeking a new rector. As I reported before, we have completed the church profile and submitted it to the Diocese. Most members required to do so have completed the Safe Church training courses on video. We are in the process of completing our outside audit. Our auditor has been quite ill and is currently working as much as he can while in rehab. Our prayers for him are needed and appreciated. The audit must be well along in progress in order to move forward in the process. Our financial team, Mary Jean Christian and Liz Villalva are working diligently to stay in touch and work with him. Based on our budget for 2024, which will be completed and presented at the Annual Meeting on February 11, we will determine what compensation package we can offer prospective priests. This will be the final step to complete before our Search Committee can begin their formal search. As I stated in my first article as a point of perspective, our interim period before hiring Fr. Bill Garrison was two and one half years!

In the meantime, how then shall we live? The writer of I Peter encourages the early church by exhorting them to "like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood" (Ch. 2: vs 5) "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light." (Ch. 2: vs. 9) We are the ones through whom God is working today. With or without a hired priest, we are the church. God has begun a good work in us and is faithful to complete it. (Paraphrase of Philippians 1:6)

Each week we have received special benediction from our visiting priests. On December 3rd, the first Sunday of Advent, Fr. Rob Bethancourt gave a most inspiring and instructive message on interpreting scripture on readiness for the coming of the Lord. The allegorical interpretation helps us to see the vivid description of the second coming as metaphor that encourages us to keep doing the loving thing. Fr. Rob referenced Stephen Covey, author of several books on success in life in the quote, "any successful venture begins with the end in view". Yes, we hope to hire a new priest. But is that our ultimate goal? We have named ourselves "an address for the Kingdom of God". We thrive on maintaining and building on that identity. The reign of God in our midst is built on every act of love, large or small, that we do.

We are called to declare the praises of the One who calls us to the light of doing that loving thing. Is there a newness that we can hope for, perhaps even before we have a new priest? There is much that we hope for that we do not yet have. Is God wanting to do a new thing in us individually?

It is not my job to answer these questions for you. I can, however, ask you to join me in asking God, through the help of the Holy Spirit who prays for us even when we don't know how to pray, to show us the way of continuing to truly do the loving thing and not grow weary! Might there be an epiphany in our near future? In glorious hope,

Pepper to taste


Directions:


- 1. Mix all ingredients together in a blender.
