A few weeks ago, I had the pleasure of presenting the Second Reading during our worship service at 8AM. For this occasion, the reading was a familiar passage, from Paul's letter to the Romans, Chapter 12:1–8. I am struck by its appropriateness, particularly as we turn our focus to Stewardship. I decided to take some time and dig deeper into what it might mean for all of us. I hope you will find what I discovered to be as meaningful for you as it is for me.

Romans 12:1-8 talks about offering oneself as a living sacrifice and the importance of one's gifts to serve others within the body of Christ. It emphasizes unity and diversity within the church. In Romans 12:1-8, the Apostle Paul presents a powerful call to a transformed life and active service within the body of Christ. This passage encourages believers to offer themselves as living sacrifices, each contributing their unique gifts for the greater good of the community. Let's explore the key themes and lessons from these verses, seeking to apply them to our daily lives.

Paul begins by urging us to present our bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God. This isn't about

literal sacrifices, but a metaphor for dedicating our entire lives to God. He emphasizes the need for a transformed mindset, urging us not to conform to the patterns of this world, but to be renewed by the renewing of our minds. This transformation enables us to discern God's will, which is good, pleasing, and perfect. Just as a living sacrifice is set apart, so are we called to live differently in the world.

Transformation begins with renewing our minds through prayer, study of God's Word, and intentional reflection. We must strive to align our thoughts and actions with God's will, allowing our lives to shine as testimonies of His transformative power.

Paul introduces the concept of spiritual gifts and underscores the importance of humility. He warns against thinking too highly of ourselves and encourages us to view ourselves with sober judgment. Just as the body has many parts with different functions, so does the body of Christ. We are interconnected and interdependent, each contributing unique gifts. Humility is essential for maintaining healthy relationships within the body of Christ. Our gifts, whether big or small, have value in God's eyes. Let's embrace our roles with humility, appreciating the diversity that enriches our community. By valuing one another's contributions, we reflect the unity and love that Christ desires for His followers.

Paul lists various spiritual gifts and their corresponding roles within the church. These gifts include prophecy, serving, teaching, encouraging, giving, leading, and showing mercy. Each believer receives at least one gift, and they are to use them diligently and with sincerity. Our gifts are not meant to be kept to ourselves; they are tools for service. As we discover our unique strengths, let's embrace them with enthusiasm and use them for the common good. Whether we're nurturing, leading, or serving, our actions should be fueled by love and devotion. Through our service, we reflect the character of Christ and fulfill our purpose within His body.

Take time each day to renew your mind through prayer and Scripture. Seek to align your thoughts with God's truth and let it guide your decisions and actions. Reflect on your strengths and weaknesses, and approach others with humility. Appreciate the diverse gifts within our church community, valuing each person's contribution. Identify your spiritual gifts and consider how you can use them to serve others. Whether it's through teaching, encouraging, or practical help, let your actions be driven by a sincere desire to bless others.

Romans 12:1-8 offers us a roadmap for a transformed life and active service within the body of Christ. By presenting ourselves as living sacrifices, renewing our minds, embracing humility and using our gifts for the common good, we participate in the beautiful tapestry of the Church. Let's commit ourselves to this journey of transformation and service, reflecting the love and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ to a world in need.

Fellow Saint Matthians!

By the time we are collectively enjoying this October Messenger, we have already received our Stewardship 2023 Packet. Some of us may have already taken time to reflect on the meaning of Saint Matthias in our lives, completed both sides of the Pledge Card and returned it either via physical mail or placed it on our offering plate to be blessed. If you are such, I want to thank you for your love and generosity for supporting Saint Matthias, its Gifts, Ministries, and Services, and the Divine Love it imbues in all of us.

For those of us who have not yet carved out time to complete and submit our Pledge Cards, I want us to take a few minutes from our schedules, look at the world around us, and ask ourselves what does Saint Matthias provide us, provide our community, provide the world at large? Amidst the turmoil of our contemporary life (the devastation of climate change on our world, world hunger and poverty, and rampant violence), it is my sincere belief that we need more communities like Saint Matthias instilling in ourselves and the world Divine Love and Compassion.

As I have written previously, our financial pledges and volunteer work currently fund approximately two-thirds of the Saint Matthias operating budget (specifically, the beauty and depth of our worship services, the varied ministries supporting our parishioners and broader community, the staff payroll, the janitorial and maintenance of the church property, insurance costs, and other administrative and management costs).

As we look towards the future, however, we collectively aspire to reestablish a full-time rector for the parish. Funding for such a position is considerable and means that our financial pledges must grow from two-thirds of the operating budget to three-fourths. As such, we are targeting for our Campaign between 75 to 100 pledges totaling between \$350,000 to \$400,000 in income.

For those of us who have not yet completed our pledge cards, let us carve out time in the next few weeks to formalize our financial commitment to Saint Matthias for 2024. Let us also reflect on the varied ministries of which we can avail ourselves here at Saint Matthias (Gifts, Ministries & Services — Saint Matthias Episcopal Church (stmatthiaswhittier.org)), and thereby re-introduce ourselves to the variety of activities for stewardship and preservation, fellowship and communion, and spiritual development and self-improvement. Most importantly, let us be inspired to offer ideas on how we can transform these ministries to address the pressing needs of the 21st Century.

Thank you for your generosity and your prayerful consideration of your pledge to Saint Matthias.




Surrender

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





