"Re-Entry" in T Minus 10...9...8...7...6...5!

Like most Messenger articles this year I should preface this one with "as I write this..." The time between writing and publishing is only two weeks. And yet recent events have made Monday's news look like the stuff of history books by Friday of the same week. Today's news is that after many weeks of worshiping electronically we are preparing to return to our church to worship and to do it as safely as possible. Hopefully we will be there - or almost there - by the time the July Messenger arrives in your mailbox.

One of the terms being bantered around for this process is "re-entry." It refers to our story since March when we were suddenly taken out of most of what was familiar to us and started living hermit-like lives. We reordered everything we did and how we did it. We mourned and adjusted and waited. Now we're coming out of that into what's familiar and also what's new.



The term re-entry puts me in mind of those whose work may have originated the term – astronauts. In a matter of seconds they are hurled out their normal environment into a situation they can't imagine in spite of all their preparations. After living in disorienting circumstances in space they make their re-entry. They describe it as violent forces pulling on them, a fiery freefall as the outer layer of the capsule burns up, terrible shaking and loud banging sounds as they plummet into earth's atmosphere at the speed of sound. Then everything calms down as they slowly descend to the earth by parachute. And this is actually the first time they know they're safe, they're going to make it.

Their experience can inform our story of re-entry: we have been buffeted by forces we've never experienced but we can be confident of a smooth reentry. We're going to make it. Astronaut Buzz Aldrin read to all on earth

from John 15 during the Apollo 11: "I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." Dedicated members, staff and clergy are working to put systems in place to keep our re-entry as safe as possible while leading worship that is meaningful and life-giving. It may be a little clunky at first. Nothing is fool-proof. But I have confidence that our wonderful St. Matthias community that bore much good fruit by figuring out ways to be together apart will experience joyous re-entry loved by God and always doing the loving thing. I can't wait to see you all.

WHAT IT IS ACTUALLY LIKE TO RE-ENTER FROM SPACE!

You do feel it when you come back from space because now you have been in a non-gravity environment for a long time and you see You look at stuff and feel And it's really a very, very strong feeling.

Several miles above the surface of the Earth, the capsule deploys its parachute. According to Frank De Winne, another ESA astronaut (he's Belgian) and Nespoli's Soyuz crewmate, that goes a little something like this:

You're almost breaking the sound barrier, and then in the opposite direction, of course. You're coming back into the normal area of flying. And this is around 30,000 feet that the parachute has to open. This is actually a very critical moment. And it's one of the only things in the Soyuz where the crew does not have a manual override. So this is only an automated system.

And what about the actual opening of that chute? De Winne again:

It's almost like a yo-yo. And you see the capsule going all around. It's much worse than in a roller coaster, because it's motions in all directions. And it's a little bit scary for some of us. For some others, it can also be fun, because they're like, 'ooh, this is the best ride I ever had."

But then?

All that's left, at that point, is the landing. Here's Nespoli, bringing us home:

The soft landing is not really soft. You prepare for it by putting your arms against your body, not touching any metallic parts, all your books against you. You're not talking, not to put the tongue in the middle of your teeth. And you're laying there, trying to be as inside your seat as well as you can. And you're waiting for this 'soft landing' to happen. Which, for me, it felt like a head-on collision between a truck and a small car. Of course, I wasn't in a small car.

Parish Profile, Stan Jamieson Confidential!!!



What you need: Drinking

- glass Water
- Index card

Re-opening Our doors for Worship at Saint Matthias

We've spent well over 2.5 months learning new ways to worship that were totally unfamiliar to all of us. We are, however, blessed to have access to the vast talents of Andrea Schmid, our Director of Communications, who created a "virtual" St. Matthias that allowed us to continue, not only with our weekly worship service, but she also maintained our Church calendar making it possible for us to continue our Small Groups and weekly administrative meetings, as well. No small task, at all. All of us owe Andrea a huge thank you for her ongoing efforts to keep us connected.

At first blush, one might think all that is required to resume worship is opening the doors. But it is a significantly greater task than that. For the past two and a half months all of us have watched and listened to our national, state and local officials as they create a roadmap to guide us forward during the pandemic. Our Bishop, following their instruction and more importantly, Divine Guidance has apprised us of related news and requirements on a routine basis throughout this unusual time. Many of you, perhaps, shared our diocesan journey through the weekly updates from Bishop Taylor.

During the last week in May, we received notice that parishes throughout our diocese could re-open beginning June 21st. Our clergy at St. Matthias created a committee to address a long list of guidelines providing, in most cases, clear cut actions that we must undertake to ensure the safety of our staff and every parishioner. The steps we have taken mirror what you now experience elsewhere. Social distancing, contactless temperature readings for all participants in worship, health screening, hand washing and sanitizing. You'll notice the absence of some familiar things. For example, no Holy Water, and no hymnals or prayer books. For the time being, there will be no Holy Eucharist. In some parishes the Eucharist may be observed wherein only the clergy partakes in the host and wine. However, at St. Matthias we will resume this observance when all of us can sit at the Table.

To date, to our knowledge, no one in our Parish family has contracted COVID-19. The measures we are taking will help us make this transition back to our traditional worship practices a healthy one. We encourage above all, your participation and in keeping with sound practices we strongly request that you bring and wear a mask, observe the health screening criteria and observe posted guidance which will be posted throughout the parish. The health screening criteria are as follows:

Do you currently have any of the following symptoms:

Fever (99F+), Chills, Muscle aches, Cough, Shortness of breath, Unexpected fatigue, Sore throat, Loss of taste or smell, Headache, Diarrhea, vomiting or nausea, Other cold symptoms?

If you prefer to take a more conservative approach to returning to worship, we will have continued streaming services on Facebook. Again, thanks to Andrea and Tom Booth for making this possible. Remember, Small Groups and administrative meetings will continue to gather via Zoom.

We look forward to seeing you when we open our doors on July 5, at 10AM. By the time you read this you have likely observed our "soft opening" on the 21st and 28th of June. Yes, things are different, as you can see, but the sense of community and fellowship prevails. We hope you will be a part of our new normal and continue your journey with us through Christ's kingdom. *Tim Adams*
