# **Christian Habits**

My goodness things are a mess. As I write this I wonder where this pandemic is headed and when a means of slowing it down will arrive. People are in the streets demanding social justice reform. The people of our country are divided in a such a way that I wonder if we can ever get back to talking civilly and respectfully with each other.

In our own community we yearn to get back home. We are experiencing our own diaspora. Zoom and Facebook are helping us remain in solidarity but nothing replaces worship and small groups meeting in person. And truthfully, as I write this, we don't know when we will be together again. We know it's going to happen but we cannot know when.

The ancient Israelites were held in captivity in Babylon in the sixth century BCE. They yearned to return to Jerusalem and Judea. They longed to rebuild the Temple which had stood for five hundred years. When would they return? Would they return at all?

What were they to do in the meantime? How might they remember who they were and whose they were? This was the job facing the priests. How were they to help their congregation get through this horrible time?

They found the answer in religious habits. Emphasizing eating Kosher and observing the Sabbath were emphasized. Festival days were to be remembered. Worship happened in homes. They did everything they could to help the people remember that they were God's chosen people and that through these habitual practices they would be able to maintain their community in captivity.

It took them over fifty years to get back home. It will take us much less than that. In the meantime, we too must remember who and whose we are. We are invited to emulate these ancient people. We are invited to do as they did. Weekly Sunday worship no matter how it might be done is important. Small groups meeting to talk and think about God are equally important. Praying at regularly scheduled times can be helpful. Reading scripture regularly is meaningful. Talking with other members of the community is recommended. Celebrating the Christian holidays as the arrive is important. Christian habits.



And in these tough times we can be Christian leaders. This is helpful not only to those around us but to our own selves too. Taking care of our neighbors. Being kind to others. Listening even when we don't necessarily agree. Remembering God's love for us and for those we meet. These are things we are called to do even in diaspora.

September begins our "program year." There is a lot to help us remember who and whose we are. Please get on board. There are many offerings. Pick a couple and join in. We are going to make it back to our Jerusalem. There is no question about that. Meanwhile partake of those things that keep each of close to God and in community with each other. Habits are important.

But these are unorthodox times. We are challenged to find ways of drawing closer to the heart of God and each other. Remembering each other in our prayers allows us to do this in a special way. So I wonder if you might want to try something: next Sunday morning, picture the people that sit near you and ask God to take especially good care of them. In this weird era of Covidtide, it's one way to follow Jesus' command to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, with all your mind" and "love your neighbor as yourself." Keep staying safe and let's pray for each other. We'll get through this. We'll be back.



# From the Editor: Twenty-Seven Years of Newsletters

I first began doing the newsletter at Emmanuel Episcopal in Fullerton in 1993. The editor then, who was also the printer, wanted to guit doing it and the Church Secretary asked me if I wanted to take it over. Bonnie and I had just gone through a weekend retreat called Cursillo and I was doing the little newsletter for that group and so I had one issue of experience which qualified me for the new job. I remember I was replacing a faucet in the Sacristy when Jean, the Parish Coordinator, asked me, and I REALLY wanted the job. We were on strike at work at the time and money was a little tight and I knew I would have to buy new software to do the job without the quality suffering. I told Jean I would have to talk it over with Bonnie first. Well, Bonnie said to go ahead without a second thought and we would make ends meet somehow, and we did. The program being used then was Aldus PageMaker, before Adobe bought them, and I think the cost was five or six hundred dollars to purchase it. I was attending Rio Hondo on the GI bill at the time and being a student saved me over 50% of the cost. I was a little shaky at first but spent a lot of time with my nose in books. I continued as editor until two years AFTER we left the church. I told Fr. Rob I would continue until he found someone to take over. Well, you know how THAT goes in churches. I finally set a deadline and the next month an editor was found.



When we first came to Saint Matthias, Millie Morse was very capably doing the *Messenger* but when she found out I had experience, she asked me if I would consider taking over and she would continue to do the folding. I did and have been doing it since 2009. I have always loved doing the newsletter but I have also believed that by my doing it I might be keeping someone else from stepping in who would also love doing it, and so I asked Andrea if we could start looking for an enthusiastic replacement. As it turns out Julian Schmid's Mother was very enthusiastic about the job and so Andrea will be taking the job on. She has brought a very nice and fresh air to our Church Communications and I have no doubt that the Messenger will also start to reflect that, and in the tradition of Millie Morse, I will continue to do the folding.

#### **Bible Study is Back!**



# BUSHEL OF Design a handv bag to tote your books this fall. What you need:

- · Plain canvas bag
- Cardboard scrap Acrylic paints (2 colors)
- 2 small paper plates
- Knife (and adult help)
- Foam brush
- Scrap paper

# What you do:

- 1. Lay the bag flat on a table, and place cardboard inside for protection.
- 2. Pour a paint dollop on each plate.
- 3. Slice the apple in half, keeping the core intact.
- 4. Brush a thin layer of paint on the cut side of an apple half. Practice making stamps on scrap paper. Use the other color on the other apple half.
- 5. Paint and stamp the bag with your final design. When dry, remove the cardboard.
- 6. Use the bag for school and Sunday school. Happy reading!


