Do Something Nice For Someone Else

Jesus was invited to the home of a Pharisee for a meal on the Sabbath. Once there Jesus talked about the relative importance of the seating around a table. Jesus talked about the power positions at a table. We all know where the power positions around a table are, don't we? They change according to the size of the table. For the standard square, four person table the entire room is taken into account in order to find the power position. Normally the power position would be the one that allows the most important person to have their back to the wall and able to survey the room. For a table that seats six or eight the power positions would be on the ends with the chair that could survey the room the most important of the two power positions. For larger conference tables the power position eventually shifts from the end to the middle. But whatever shape the table might take the power positions are instinctively known, aren't they?

Then in the story, as always, Jesus surprises us as we listen to him with some countercultural advice. He tells those in the room it would be better not to go to the power positions. He says to do so might cause the person who does so embarrassment because they might be asked to move to another seat allowing someone of more importance to take their place. In fact Jesus tells everybody to take the least important place at the table. They then might actually be asked to move up to a more important position and be honored in that way.

As the story continues Jesus suggests what the guest list in the Kingdom of God would preferably look like. Please let me quote him. "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

Oh man. There he goes again turning everything on its head. Could he possibly have said anything more counter-cultural? Do it Jesus says, primarily because they can't repay you. And know this. God is watching and this is what God wants you to do.

If this were from other than a church you might be rolling your eyes at what Jesus is saying. From a church though for some reason it is ok to hear stuff like this because we know Jesus is right. But the rest of the time this good advice just isn't a practical idea if you want to get ahead.

I am reminded of something in this same vein that I hear occasionally. It goes something like this. You know what sort of a person you are dealing with by watching how they treat people either when they don't have to be nice or when no one is watching.

Well, I guess it's time to say something about the story. It isn't about getting ahead. It's not about getting rich or earning top dog status. It's about being human, and a decent, compassionate human being at that. I can't tell you God wants us to be rich or famous. I leave that to the prosperity preachers who are happy to intimate that. I can tell you God wants us to be the best human being you can be. Being a decent, compassionate human being turns out to be self rewarding and a great example to others.

Here's some advice for all of us and I hand it out regularly. If we are depressed or bored or down in the dumps for whatever reason there is a simple action we can take to feel better immediately. You don't want to miss this. Do something nice for someone else and preferably perform this service for someone who can't pay you back. I guarantee you will immediately feel better. It works every time.

And maybe there will be a child watching. Children don't care much about what we say, only what we do. Hopefully they will want to mimic what they have seen. And the world will be a little better place.

Finally, the ultimate example of doing the loving thing, and that is what we are talking about here, was done by the creator. God tore the fabric of reality and entered into the world in the form of a helpless child and through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ opened to us the gates of eternal life. God did it for us, a people totally incapable of paying God back for what God had done. God set the example. As God's children maybe we can learn from it.



Can we realistically hope to be resurrected after we die? Is it reasonable to believe in an afterlife, or is this a case where reason and faith diverge? Jesus said that the greatest commandment is to love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself. Are we to believe that the idea of an afterlife doesn't make sense but we should believe in it anyway because the Bible tells us so? To me, that would make it very hard to follow the part of the commandment that says to love the Lord your God with all your mind, as well as all your heart and all your soul.

In my book Dreams and Resurrection, I try to explain why I think we have good reasons to believe in an afterlife and that, in fact, it is the idea of eternal death that doesn't make sense. I would love to share my thoughts with you and to learn about your thoughts on this topic, in a discussion group on the book this fall. Care Receivers Share How Their Stephen Ministers Made a Difference

Ralph - My Stephen Minister was a consistent presence walking with me throughout my divorce. He would always show up, and most importantly, he refused to give up on me. I'll forever be grateful for the way he changed my life.

HARVEST * Trail Mix*

This portable snack combines favorite



What you need:

- 1/4 cup maple syrup
- 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- ²/₃ cup pecan pieces
- 1/3 cup roasted pumpkin seeds
- 1/3 cup almonds
- 1/4 cup raisins
- $\frac{2}{3}$ cup dried fruit (any)

What you do:

- 1. Microwave syrup, spices, seeds and nuts for 30 seconds at a time, stirring frequently, until mixture thickens.
- 2. Spread the mixture on a baking sheet lined with wax paper. Let cool and harden.
- 3. Break the candied nuts into chunks. Combine with dried fruit.
- 4. Store in airtight container.
