

A Reflection on This Easter Season

In our tradition, the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Jesus Christ are central events that embody profound spiritual truths. The Crucifixion represents the ultimate sacrifice, demonstrating God's boundless love for humanity. It is a moment of deep sorrow, yet also one of great love, as Jesus willingly endures suffering for the redemption of us all. This act of selfless love invites us to live lives of compassion, service, and forgiveness, following Christ's example.

The Resurrection is the triumphant affirmation of life over death, light over darkness. It is the central event of our faith, the source of our hope and the foundation of our mission. It is not just a historical fact, but a living reality that transforms our lives and our world. It signifies that love is stronger than hate, and life eternal awaits beyond the temporal struggles. But what does it mean to live as Resurrection people in our daily lives? How do we witness to the power of God's love that overcomes sin and death? How do we embody the joy and peace that Christ offers to us and to all people?

Perhaps we look at the stories of the disciples, who encountered the risen Lord in various ways. They weren't always ready or willing to believe. They had doubts and fears. They wrestled with how to understand what happened and what it meant to them. They needed the guidance and support of the community. They also needed the personal touch and the gentle voice of Jesus, who met them where they were and invited them to follow Him. We can relate to their experiences because we too face challenges and uncertainties in our faith journey. We need the fellowship and the sacraments of our Church. We need the presence and the call of Jesus, who comes to us in different ways and invites us to follow Him.

The Scriptures, inspired by the Holy Spirit, provide us an avenue to Jesus, as well. They testify to His life, death, and resurrection. And as we read and study the Scriptures, we can ask the Holy Spirit to open our minds and hearts to the truth and beauty of God's Word. We can ask Jesus to speak to us personally, to reveal himself to us, and to show us His will for our lives.


Jesus comes to us through the people around us, especially those who need his love and mercy. As we serve and care for others, we can see the face of Christ in them and share the good news of his Resurrection with them. We learn from them as they teach us about faith, hope, and love. We can pray for them and with them, as we join our voices and our hearts to the prayer of Christ for the world.

Jesus comes to us through the events and the circumstances of our lives, both the joys and the sorrows, the blessings, and the trials. As we reflect on our lives, we can discern the signs of God's grace and providence, as well as the challenges and opportunities for growth and conversion. We can thank God for all that he has done and is doing for us and ask him for his guidance and strength. We can also offer our lives to God, as we seek to do his will and to glorify Him in all that we do.

These are some ways that we can live as Resurrection people, who are not afraid of death, but confident in life. We needn't be discouraged by evil, but confident in life; who are not discouraged by evil but inspired by goodness; not indifferent to the world, but passionate for the kingdom of God. We celebrate the Resurrection every Sunday, when we gather to hear the Word of God and share Holy Communion. We also observe the Easter season for fifty days, from Easter Sunday to Pentecost, when we rejoice in the risen Lord and his gift of the Holy Spirit.

The Crucifixion and the Resurrection form the heart of the Christian faith, offering a path to salvation and a call to live out the Gospel's message of love and reconciliation every day. We can thank God for all that he has done and is doing for us and ask him for his guidance and strength. We should discern the signs of God's grace and providence in our lives, as well as the challenges and opportunities for growth and conversion. We can offer our lives to God as we seek to do his will and to glorify him in all that we do.

in the eternal Now of abundant love and endless blessing.



SHEPHERD'S PIE


SERVES 6


- 1 1/2 lbs ground beef (I use ground turkey)
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme
- 2 cups beef stock
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 cup finely diced carrot
- 4 small stalks of celery sliced
- 1/2 cup corn kernel

(I use whatever frozen vegetables I have in the freezer)

- 1. Brown ground beef, drain fat.
- 2. Add onions& garlic, cook until softened.
- 3. Stir in flour, salt, pepper, thyme
- 4. Add stock, Worcestershire, bay leaf, & carrots & celery.
- 5. Cover loosely and simmer, stirring occasionally for 20 minutes or until quite thick and carrots are tender.
- 6. Stir in corn.
- 7. Add salt to taste, remove bay leaf.
- 8. Spread in 11x7 baking dish, let cool slightly.
- 9. For the topping: In boiling salted water, cook potatoes with garlic until tender.
- 10. Drain well and mash, beat in milk, salt& pepper.
- 11. Spread over meat mixture (easiest if you start from edges).
- 12. Bake at 400 for 20 minutes or until filling is bubbling.

You can make ahead of time and store in the refrigerator. Just add 20 minutes to the baking time.








- 5-6 medium potatoes
- 6 garlic cloves, peeled & lightly crushed

11/4 hours | 30 min prep

- 3/4 cup <u>2% low-fat milk</u> or <u>buttermilk</u>
- salt & pepper
- (I used already made mashed potatoes from Costco)
